


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# **Message for Parents and Guardians from the Fire Marshal**



It's my pleasure to present you and your child our 2022 Fire Safety Gazette. This year's Fire Prevention Week theme is "Fire Won't Wait, Plan you escape". Please use this Gazette as a helpful tool to learn together with your family about fire safety. Use the stories, puzzles, and games in this Gazette to talk about fire safety in your home, and how to make sure everybody gets out safe! This year's theme is important-everyone should know how to get out of their home quickly and safely in the event of a fire.

When you hear the smoke alarm, it's time to get out! Walk through your home with your family and identify multiple exits out of each room in the house. If windows or doors are blocked, clear them so they can be easily accessed and opened to exit through. Its always recommended that you have 2 exit routes from every room in your house. Once you get out of your home-have a safe place to meet up and meet the fire department when they arrive.

Parents-practice escaping with your young ones. Make them familiar with how to open a door or window and show them where you'll meet. Teach them to close doors behind them, crawl low if it's smokey, and to never, ever go back in. Remind them not to bring anything with them-those items can be replaced!

The Office of the Fire Marshal along with our Fire Departments are dedicated to the safety of New Brunswickers. This important week is a partnership with Insurance Brokers Association of New Brunswick-our major sponsor of the Fire Chief for a Day draw. Every child who completes a ballot included with this Gazette has a chance to be drawn as New Brunswick's Fire Chief for a day in the fall of 2022.

Fire safety begins at home with working, properly installed smoke alarms. Learn the sounds of fire safety, and know what to do!

cake and to top things off, she got to take a drive in a big red fire truck around the village with lights and sirens.


A great day was had by all who attended.

# Smoke alarms at home




 Choose interconnected smoke alarms for your home, so when one sounds, they all sound.





- IInstall smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Make sure your smoke alarms work.
   Your family is not safe if they can't hear the smoke alarm.
- Test smoke alarms every month and replace batteries at least once every year.
- Smoke alarms do not last forever. Replace smoke alarms every 10 years.
- When you hear a smoke alarm, you may have less than 2-minutes to get everyone outside and safe.



### If the alarm sounds...

- If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- If you have to escape through a smokefilled room, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your nearest exit.

Call 9-1-1 or the fire department from outside your home.

# Escape plan in case of fire



Make a home escape plan with your family. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.





Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.



Have an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole, mailbox) a safe distance from the house where everyone should meet.




Practice your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.

Practice using a different way out. Close all doors behind you as you leave.







Go from room to room and answer the questions below. Give yourself one point for each "yes" answer. When you're done, add up the points to find out how fire safe your home is.


### **Smoke Alarms / Home Fire Escape**


